

How To Vote in New Hampshire

Thanks for wanting to Register to Vote in New Hampshire!

There are two upcoming elections in NH this fall:

- Primary - September 8th - Candidates from the same party compete against each other to determine who will represent their party in the general election
- General - November 8th - This is the major election. It decides who will represent both our Presidential and State positions in government.

To guarantee your registration follow these simple steps:

- For easiest registration have all completed **14 days before the election**

To register in person:

1. Call your city or town clerk and request to make a registration to vote
 - [Click here to find you city/town clerks information](#)
2. To register to vote you need to prove you're over 18 (identity) and you live in NH (domicile)
 - To prove identity: Any type of I.D. that proves you are of legal voting age
 - To prove domicile: Anything mailed to you with your name and address to prove state of residence

For example, any state-issued I.D. is acceptable. An easy option is your driver's license, which proves both who you are and it has your address on it to prove you're a resident of the state.

In addition, bring a pen and a mask, and prepare to fill out forms in order to confirm your voter registration

After this you are registered to vote!

To Register Via Email:

1. Call or email your town or city clerk find that information [here](#)
2. Your clerk will send you the forms needed

3. Fill out the registration form
4. Send a picture that proves your identity and domicile
 - To prove identity: Any type of I.D. that proves you are of legal voting age.
 - To prove domicile: Anything mailed to you with your name and address to prove state of residence.

For example, any state-issued I.D. is acceptable. An easy option is your driver’s license, which proves both who you are and it has your address on it to prove you’re a resident of the state.

5. You will need a witness (can be a neighbor or a friend) to sign a form confirming that they saw you fill out the forms.
6. You will need to scan or take a legible photo of all the forms and you papers that prove identity and domicile.
7. Send it back to your clerk.

After this you are registered to vote!
